Since leaving WHSG I have had a varied and mostly interesting life. I first went to E K Cole as a junior telephonist. I didn't at first think I would master the complications of a very busy switchboard. I did and stayed two years before moving to a City shipping office where our team was reputed to be the fastest switchboard in the City. It was with much regret that I left this job to move to Swansea where my then father-in-law was the manager of the Pier Hotel in the Mumbles, a 'small fishing village near Swansea' according to Catherine Zeta Jones! There I learned to do banquet catering, run a busy membership club, drive a van and manage the wages for a staff of probably fifty. My daughter was born there. We left to manage a city centre pub with 13th century origins. This led to a larger city centre pub where my son was born. It also led to divorce and a welcome return to Southend. I enrolled at the College of Technology, as it was then, finished the course and went to work at HM Customs in Alexander House.

I loved art and textiles and so took a job at an interior design showroom, which taught me a lot about fabrics and design concepts. My attention was then caught by a new degree course starting up at the Royal School of Needlework, in hand embroidery. The idea of training in such a specialised skill was very appealing and being based in Hampton Court Palace was another definite attraction. Lesley Palmby (nee Webb) 1941-2010

Joyce Winifred Cavill 1922-2010

On a cold foggy day almost at the end of last year I went to the crematorium to say goodbye to Joyce who had been my friend since we were 11 years old. We met at West Ham High School. I lived at West Ham and Joyce lived at East Ham. The school at Stratford was on a circular tram route so we could both use it, going either way. My family had always wanted to live in Southend and we found the opportunity in 1935. I was able to transfer to Westcliff High School and next year Joyce's family followed when her father, who lost a leg in the First World War, was transferred to the Labour Exchange in Southend, primarily to look after people with similar disabilities.

Then the next war overtook us and on 1st January 1940 we both passed our Civil Service examinations and were sent to the Air Ministry, in two different departments. Joyce had never been in very good health and didn't like the travelling to London every day. She decided to resign and then it was announced that girls were needed by the WRENS. Joyce volunteered at once. She was first employed as a teleprinter at Southend and was stationed at the Pier for some time. Then she was transferred to HMS Westcliff on Chalkwell Esplanade for the rest of the war. We met at various times. She then had various jobs with solicitors and at one time a Greek shipping owner in London. After a while she joined the Civil Service again, this time at the Department of Health & Social Security, where she met **Ann Mott**, whom I was pleased to see again at Joyce's funeral. Joyce was a very quiet girl, who never married but gave all her time and energies to various animal charities such as the PDSA, Guide Dogs for the Blind, the Cats Protection Society and many others.

For the last few years of Joyce's life, she had had several falls and finally died alone but, always thinking of the various animals, she left all her money to be shared out equally between about 10 animal charities.

A Message from the Headteacher

This has been a momentous year for Westcliff High School for Girls

In October 2010 the school was declared **OUTSTANDING** by Ofsted.

This is the first time since Ofsted began gradings in 1992 that we have achieved this accolade.

The main findings of this inspection were:

- ❖ Over a third of lessons are **outstanding** and few are less than good
- ❖ Students have excellent attitudes to learning
- ❖ The tenacity of senior leaders has resulted in exceptional improvement since the last inspection

As Headteacher, I am delighted that the school has achieved this accolade; 'It is a tribute to the hard work and dedication of pupils and staff that they have been able to show to Ofsted our school is truly outstanding'.

In December 2010 the Headteacher, Dr Paul Hayman, was invited to Clarence House to receive the Prince's Teaching Institute Mark for the school. This is a recognition for the work of individual subjects in the school, who have committed themselves to ambitious targets with an emphasis on rigour and the development of the quality of teaching so all pupils can succeed with ambitious texts and ideas.

Three departments at school are currently involved in this work, English, History and Science and we are hopeful others will be joining them this year.

In March 2011 the school gained Academy Status using the government's fast track route for outstanding schools.

In April 2011 the school production was the highly ambitious "We Will Rock You". With brilliant choreography, singing and music and a specially hired lighting and sound system the school rocked to one of the best shows ever put on in Westcliff's history. Praise for the quality of the show has been received from all who saw it.

On Tuesday 17 May 2011 the school was honoured to welcome His Royal Highness The Duke of Gloucester to carry out the official opening of our new West Wing. His Royal Highness toured the new building and meet with staff, students and guests before carrying out the official opening ceremony.

We were very pleased that His Royal Highness chose to speak himself, telling us how impressed he was with the new building.

It was a real privilege for the school to have a member of the Royal Family to carry out this event and help to recognise our achievements.
